EXAMPLE

Dancing

- 1. Do you enjoy dancing? [Why/Why not?]
- 2. Has anyone ever taught you to dance? [Why/Why not?]
- 3. Tell me about any traditional dancing in your country.
- 4. Do you think that traditional dancing will be popular in the future? [Why/Why not?]

You should say:

- how this person is related to you
- · what this person looks like
- · what kind of person he/she is

Family similarities

Example questions

- 1. In what ways can people in a family be similar to each other?
- 2. Do you think that daughters are always more similar to mothers than to male relatives?
- 3. What about sons and fathers?
- 4. In terms of personality, are people more influenced by their family or by their friends? In what ways?

Genetic research

Example questions:

- 1. Where can people in your country get information about genetic research?
- 2. How do people in your country feel about genetic research?
- 3. Should this research be funded by governments or private companies? Why?

- 1. Which instrument do you like listening to most? [WHY?]
- 2. Have you ever learned to play a musical instrument? [Which one?]

Example questions:

- 1. Why do some people think that modern lifestyles are not healthy?
- 2. Why do some people choose to lead unhealthy lives?
- 3. Should individuals or governments be responsible for making peoples lifestyle healthy?

4. What could be done to encourage people to live in a healthy way?

- 3. Why is competition often seen as important in today's society?

- 1. Do you prefer to have one particular friend or a group of friends? [Why?]
- 2. What do you like doing most with your friends?

Important choices

Example questions

- 1. What are the typical choices people make at different stages of their lives?
- 2. Should important choices be made by parents rather than by young adults?
- 3. Why do some people like to discuss choices with other people?

Choices in everyday life

Example questions:

- 1. What kind of choices do people have to make in their everyday life?
- 2. Why do some people choose to do the same things every day? Are there any disadvantages in this?
- 3. Do you think that people today have more choice to make today than in the past?

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
